Second Grade

When league began in 1908 patrons J.J.Gilitinan promised a curtain raiser for every game. In most cases this was Second Grade.

Second Grade as it was known from 1908 to 1915 was a competition for clubs second best teams, and the competition would also field teams from stronger affiliate clubs. Sydney (all black) team was initially seen as a district club and became the first non First Grade club to play Second Grade. They weren't quite strong enough to compete with First Grade clubs, but entered teams in Second and Third Grade Second Grade It would continue in this manner until 1916, with teams from Mosman(1910-14), Marrickville(1911-15), Waverley(1911-12), Banksia(1911) and West Sydney(1912-13).

The affiliated clubs to compete alongside of South Sydney second grade from our district were :-

- South Sydney Federal (1910-12)
- Redfern United (1911-14)
- Grosvenor (1911-15)
- Surry Hills (1912,15)
- Randwick (1914-15)

In 1915 moves were a foot to consolidate second grade as the teams were grouped into divisions, Division A the first grade aligned teams and Division B the rest. By 1916 with the Great War in full swing and large numbers of players enlisting Second Grade ended and only First Grade teams could enter/ This would become known as Reserve Grade.

All teams would complete in this manner within the NSWRL until the formation of the NRL in 1998 which saw interstate teams pull out of the reserve grade competition, under the Super League War peace deal. When the competition became known as the NSWRL First Division.



Sports Ground Cup

Just like First Grade with the City Cup, Second Grade started a seeded knockout tournament at the end of the season. Only the Top 8 district clubs could play, and you needed to have played less than 3 first gade game.

The first trophy put up was the Sports Ground Cup. The team who won it twice, would keep the trophy.

League Cup

When the Sports Group Cup was won outright by South Sydney in 1916, it was replaced by the League Cup.

Just like before it was end of season seeded knockout.

By the end of 1920 the City Cup / League had grown to be bigger than the premiership.

The format changed in 1921 with the early departure of the Kangaroos, just like in First Grade the second half of the competition reverted to be a standalone League Cup that ran for 8 rounds, before a Top 4 finals. This format would occur again in 1924. While in 1922 and 1923 the competition points of the second round would count for both bother premiership and League Cup. In the final year 1925 the League Cup reverted back to an end of season knockout format.

George Dawson

George Dawson was a name famous with the early years of Second Grade. Dawson joined South Sydney in 1909 and played First Grade in 1909 and Second Grade between 1910 to 1912. He was involved in the club as the second grade selector between 1910 to 1914 and Second Grade secretary between 1913 and 1925.

One of his greatest achievements is that between 1913 and 1925 the team finished 1,2 or 3 every year except for 1919, where flu pandemic caused havoc. After missing out on the premiership finals, that made up for it by winning the League Cup.

His record as administrator is first class winning 6 premierships and 7 League Cups.



Percy Horne



You cannot forget the other great Reserve Grade administrator, and that was Percy Horne. Horne took over from Dawson in 1926 as secretary.

As a player Horne was a member of the famous undefeated team of 1917 that won the premiership and League Cups. While he won the League Cup again in 1918.

In 1926 after retiring, he took over as Second Grade coach. A role he held between 1926 and 1934. The team would win 6 premierships under guidance.

As a secretary he oversaw South Sydney for 50 seasons from 1926 to 1975. In his time he oversaw South Sydney win 13 reserve grade premierships. A great record for the Grand old Man of Rugby League.

"You see, it's teamwork that counts in building a great club, on the playfield and off," Percy Horne said. "You can't get far if you can't pull together. But, when you all pull together, you can go anywhere!".

Dutchy Anderson

Behind every great first grade team are a group of great clubmen. On such clubman in the early years was Ed "Dutchy" Anderson. Anderson was a five-eighth who played with South Sydney in the period 1913 to 1921. He captained the Reserve Grade team between 1916 and 1918, leading the 1917 undefeated team. Overall, he would win 3 reserve grade premierships 1913,1 1914 and 1917.





Bill Rowley

Another regular in reserve grade in the early years was Bill Rowley, a winger who was the 1914 reserve grade premiership captain. He would play in 1913, 1914 and 1917 premiership winning teams and winning the 1914, 1915 and 1916 League Cups.

Jim Breen

In the 1920s there were so many great players, sometimes we forget players binding their time in reserve grade. One such player was halfback Jim Breen who played in 5 successive reserve grade grand final appearance between 1923 to 1927 and again in 1929. He won reserve grade premierships before finally getting his opportunity in first grade.



Jim Tait

Another player who had a long career in reserve grade was Jim Tait. Tait would play with South Sydney from 1924 to 1936 and was one of the great clubmen. A five- eight or fullback he played many times behind a five-man pack. He would go on to win 4 reserve grade premierships in 1924, 1925, 1927 and 1934. In 1956 he would return to premiership success this time as a coach.

Jack Lawrence Jnr

While Jack Lawrence is a famous name in Souths history during World War II it was his son, who won two reserve grade premierships in the centres.



Norm Nilson

In the 50's one player won all three reserve grade premierships. That was Norm Nilson a prop. He won the 1952,1953 and 1956 titles. Norm was fast in 1951 he won the fastest forward competition on grand final day.



Ray Mason

Ray Mason was another one of the 1950s reserve grade stars, winning two premierships as captain in 1952 and 1956. A halfback who featured in first grade success he was able the lead the reserve grade team at the beginning and end of his career.



Alan Heiler

The 1960s saw a new breed of players coming through but a unsung hero in reserve grade premiership success was Lana Heiler. A winger who won two premierships and stared on the day.

George Piggins

George has a special mention in the 1960s group of reserve grade premiership winners. Stuck behind a group of international forwards, Piggins would play a large part of his career in reserve player making the grade in 1966. While in 1968 he was part of an international start studded line up.





Mark Ross

Mark Ross was a standout in the reserve grade 1983 season. He topped the try scoring list with 15 and top the point scorers list also. He was vital is so many wins during the season.

Arthur Hennessy

Arthur Hennessy played his part in the early success of reserve grade. Not as a player, but as a coach. He would coach South Sydney to premiership victory in 1913, 1914 and 1917. He was at the helm when we also won 6 League Cups in succession. The club honoured him by giving him the reserve grade Sports Ground Cup trophy, which we won outright.





Dave Watson

The other coach who played a big part in our server grade premiership success was Dave Watson. He took over in World War II winning two titles in 1943 and 1945. Before he moved up to first grade. He returned during in 1951 for two more reserve grade premierships 1952 and 1953. He had won four premierships as a coach, after also featuring in the 1931 reserve grade premiership as a player.

Dean Hawkins - Player of the Year


Chris Isouard - The story of a rugby league underdog

It was the first Sunday in the winter of 2019 and Dean Hawkins hit the Ringrose Park turf with minutes left in the first half. A fractured collarbone, ouch. Referee Kasey Badger's time off whistle signifies it's the last we'll see of the kid they call Footy Dean for the afternoon but little did we know it would be curtains for the season.

Weeks earlier Dean was touted in the media as being next inline to make his NRL debut with journalist Brent Read describing him as "an Adam Reynolds clone". A huge wrap for the Matraville Tigers junior who grew up idolising Adam Reynolds.

The career of many rugby league players can be compared to a rollercoaster, Dean is no exception. Dean has always been the underdog – he's taken the hard road more than once but his love for the Rabbitohs keeps the dream alive.

As champion footballer, Henrik Larsson once said, "You



Fast forward to April 2021 and Footy Dean gets the call up to make his first grade debut. What a moment, the rollercoaster is back on track. The highs of Dean's debut came crashing down as he leapt towards a group of 30 mates at fulltime. Dean knicks himself on the fence and requires 15 stitches and sits out two weeks of footy. There's that rollercoaster again. A few weeks later the 2021 NSW Cup competition was cancelled due to COVID-19 restrictions. Another setback for Footy Dean.

The Rabbitohs then move on club legend Adam Reynolds at season's end - possible replacements were thrown around in the media with all but a red pen put through Dean. The screams are getting louder on the rollercoaster and Dean's learning a lot about himself.

Down at Coogee, Dean's manager Tyran Smith runs his clients through their paces on the famous Coogee Stairs. One of Tyran's mottos is to "train when your opposition are resting". Among the stair runners is Dean Hawkins - his way of steadying the rollercoaster or at least trying to. While Dean is overlooked as Reynolds' replacement after suffering a hamstring injury it doesn't stop him from developing as a footballer. In 2022, he does get a cameo in first grade putting on a masterclass shutting out eventual grand finalists the Eels 26-0.

Which leads us to this year. A player of Dean's experience and calibre fighting for a contract has left many puzzled. He just picked up another NSW Cup Player of the Year Award for the entire competition. Each setback has made Dean into a stronger player and most importantly a leader - known for his kicking, organising, taking the line on and not afraid to put his body on the line. One thing not widely known is Dean basically runs the NSW Cup training sessions, those 80 plus games of NSW Cup are paying dividends.

The support for Footy Dean has grown from 30 mates at a fence to thousands of Rabbitohs members singing his praises and calling for NRL selection. If anyone deserves to win this Sunday it's the kid that plenty have written off. Dean sums up the Rabbitohs NSW Cup season - they were down and out but fought their way back.



1913-18 - The Great War

Prelude

The history of South Sydney second grade dates back to the period that pre-dates district rugby union, when South Sydney won the First Junior competition(second grade equivalent) in 1898. But it would take until 1912 for South Sydney to rebuild its second grade to be a force, where they came in third in the premiership. The one important change was the appointment of a non-playing coach Arthur Hennessy. Hennessy would run the second grade teams for the next seven years, and was instrumental in turning out quality players.

Season 1913

Our first premiership success came in 1913. The team dominated so much they won the first 10 rounds of the 11 round competition, finally putting on the record 102-2 result over Mossman. Bill Rowley and captain Wally Dymant were the dominate players that year, with the younger Roy Horder also playing his part. Ed Rigney, Bill Groves and Roy Almond got called up into the Combined second grade that year. While Dwyer, Dalton and Downey dominated the try scorers list. As the team entered the finals they got a shock when Grosvenor pipped them in the last round. But in the business end of the season, they power past Redfern United 33 nil, and Glebe 8-2 for a rematch. In the Top 2 clash to decide the premiership they won 10-3 to win their first title.

1914 was a tight contest all year our biggest rivals were Glebe, Grovsenor and Easts. Our biggest win came in the last round against Randwick when we beat them 33-8 where Dalton scored three tries. Next up was a clash with Easts where the game ended in a tight 7 all draw where Dalton and Roy Horder scored points. As we headed into the final 4 two points behind Norths and Glebe. We went into the Top 4 clash against Glebe needing a win to remain in the running. With tries to Dalton, Rowley and Thompson saw us win 11-6 and resulting in a sensational 3-way playoff for the right to play in the final. We first had to beat Norths which we did 29-7, then rematch against Glebe where we won in a tight contest 6-0. This setup a final against archrivals Easts which we won in a tight contest 6-5 to win back-to-back premierships. Our 2nd title. To top off the year the team went on to win the Sports

Ground Cup knockout by beating Easts again 16-15.

1915 was another good season but it came down to a last round clash against Balmain. We weren't able to stop them that day But the year was not lost as we went on to win the Sport Ground Cup beating Glebe 9-5 and getting to keep the Sports Ground Cup, with Rowley captaining us that day.





Season 1916

1916 saw us once again win the end of season new League Cup knockout beating Wests 18-3, with a young Alf Blair scoring, while William Bruce was scoring on the wing a Dutchy Anderson was in charge.






Undefeated - Season 1917

Was a great year for our reserve grade team as went through the season undefeated beating Balmain 14-2 in the last round to secure our 3rd premiership. Captain Dutchy Anderson lead they way with Les Arthur and a young Vic Lawrence dominating the try scorers. A young Alf Blair and Perc Horne was pushing through the grades. We would dominate Annandale and Norths during the year. But the year wasn't over as the team once again won the League Cup knockout our 4th victory in a row with



While the focus was on the first grade team as they launched the premiership campaign, Souths continued their undefeated run until round 6 when they met Glebel won that day. We went on to end up second that year. But we made amends in the League Cup beating 16-5 before going on to beat Easts in the final 7-4. Winning our 5th straight League Cup Vic Lawrence and William Bruce were the dominate try scorers during the year.

Season 1919

With the great war over and players returning from the battle front, the year was a slow one before we came home strong to win the League Cup for a sixth straight year. Beating Norths in the final 10-7.



97 Years since we met in a Final

Looking back in history its been a long time since South Sydney and North Sydney have actually met in a premiership decider. In fact, you need to go all the way back to 1926 to see when these two teams met on the field of battle in reserve grade. In the first Top 4 finals system in 1926 South Sydney were Minor Premiers, 7 points clear of second place. North Sydney however had hung onto 4th spot by a competition point after losing their last round encounter.

During the season South Sydney and North Sydney had met twice. The first encounter in Round 3 South Sydney had a runaway win, winning 52-2 with Reg Williams scoring a hat trick of tries and 2 goals, Vic Funnell a double, Harry Finch a double, Dave Watson and Oscar Quinlivan a try each. Jack Jones booted 7 goals while Tait kicked 2 goals.



In the next match North Sydney had vastly improved, with Souths still winning on the day 10-5 with Jack Why and Tom Barry scoring and Jimmy Tait kicked 2 goals.

Souths went into the final after a good win against Wests in the semi-final, while Norths caused an upset when they down Newtown 15-11 in the other semifinal. That setup a classic encounter.

McAnulty was sent off early in the game. At one stage Norths had skipped out to a 3-10 lead. But by halftime South Sydney had regained the lead in a tight contest 11-10. In the second half South Sydney made hacks of North Sydney's second thirteen, as they went on dominate the second half to win 25-



13. Interstate centre Sid Harriss played a wonderful game for the winners who registered their fourth successive premiership win.

Try Scorers that day were Les Dolan, Tom Barry, Tom Craigie, Sid Harris, Jim Breen, Jack Lodge, Jack Lawrence. While Jack Jones kicked 2 goals.

The win was made even more meritorious given that the South Sydney fullback, W. McAnulty, was sent off early in the first half. Souths therefore

had to play nearly three quarters of the game with only 12 men. This must surely show the wonderful strength of the South Sydney team.

1923-1934 - Invincibles

Prelude

As the roaring 20s getting into full swing and Arthur Hennessy stepping aside, Secretary George Dawson worked his wonders with the next generation of players. And as in the past it was a mix of youth and experience that led the way. In 1920 Souths were runners up after Glebe were able to overcome Norths in the last match. While in 1921 we again were runners up in the shortened season. 1922 saw us once again in the winner's circle as they beat Glebe 5-0 in the League Cup final after Hennessy handed over the coach reigns to John Rosewell.

Season 1923

1923 season got off to a flyer as we built on the 1922 success winning the first 4 games before losing to Balmain in a narrow loss 5-7. Not to undone they then went through the rest of the premiership season undefeated, beating Balmain in the return match 8-7 and then beating them again 13-6 in the premiership decider to win their 4th premiership. Bryan Moloney was the star that day scoring two tries,



Our 5th premiership. Moloney once again was the dominate try scorer and a young Jim Tait top scorer. Robert Booth was the captain of the team while a young Alby Carr and Jim Breen were making the grade.

1925 was a special year for South Sydney and Reserve Grade played their part. When both First Grade and Reserve Grade competitions were suspended 3 rounds from the end, to start the City Cup, Souths and Balmain were equal leaders in reserve grade, both having lost two matches. So, it was decided to play a premiership decider. Jim Breen was leading the team once again and he and Jimmy Tait were leading the point scoring. Moloney was again dominating the try scoring list. Playing that day in the final were Sid Harris and Eddie Root, while we played with the 5-man pack formation with Frank Brogan, Jack Why and Les Dolan in the halves.





Season 1928




Season 1933


Prelude

Season 1967 started slowly but then the team went on a 7-game winning streak. Then we ended the season on another 6-game winning run to finish Minor Premiers. Alan Heiler once again dominated the try scoring list and Colin Dunn the point scorers. Wayne Stevens, Bob Grant, Arthur Branighan were the main players that year. In the first semi-final we played Balmain losing 2-8. Then in preliminary final we beat Parramatta 7-4. But in the Grand Final rematch with Balmain we lost 7-11. Even the presence of Ray Branighan, Gary Stevens, Paul Sait and Bob Grant weren't enough, that day.

Season 1968

Season 1968 started in one of the most brutal contests South Sydney First Grade versus Reserve Grade trial. The

game exploded with the trail being stopped by Ron Coote. South Sydney were fielding a reserve grade team full of internationals that year. The season started with a 8 match winning run and finished with a 10 match winning run. The regular season ended with South Sydney 7 points clear of the opposition. Russell Amatto and Greg Norgard were the top try scorers, While Kevin Longbottom nearing the end of his career was our top point scorer. We once again met Balmain in a semifinal and destroyed them that day winning 30-2, with tries all over the park. That then setup a Grand Final with Manly. The team fielded international Bob McCarthy, Ray Branighan, Ivan Jones, Gary Stevens, Paul Sait and George Piggins, coming from behind to win 17-7. Winning our 19th premiership.



Season 1983

In 1983 Souths returned to a Grand Final for the first time in 15 years. The season got off to steady start before the team came home strong winning the last 5 games. It was mix of youth in Craig Coleman, Les Davidson, George Longbottom Ross Harrington, and some hard heads Mark Ross, and Greg Mackey dominated the try and point scorer lists. Experience came from Ken Wright, Greg Rick Bourke and John Jarvie. We finished the regular season as Minor Premiers.IN the first semifinal we got beaten 16-20 by Manly. Next up was St George who we encounter for 18-8, before a rematch with Manly in Grand Final. In a tight game we won 12-6, Ross Harrington scored a double that day. Winning our 20th premiership.

It would be our last Reserve Grade Grand Final appearance for 40 years.

Their opponents that day were Manly who also had some big names in their side including Mal Cochran, Michael Blake and Rick Chisolm. The final score of 12 - 6 was a fair result as we were minor premiers and thoroughly deserved our premiership that season. Funnily enough I have met players from both sides over the years and I was with Michael Blake and Mal Cochran in Forster at the Family of League weekend in February.

Ross went on to play some wonderful games for our club as a first-grade winger making his FG debut late in 1983 then mostly first grade from then on. Our 1984 miracle comeback win in the FG semi-final against Manly, after being down 14-0 was a game to remember, what a great result that was for the club. The reserve grade side have provided a Segway for first grade success for many years with Ross, Mario, Les and Craig all playing starring roles in our 1989 minor premiership side a few years after the 1983 reserve grade success. The current Australian team doctor (I think so anyway) is Nathan Gibbs and he was also part of the 1983 reserve grade premiership side along with Ken Stewart, Robert Simpkins and Ken Wright.

I can see some bright lights on the horizon in this seasons NSW Cup side with players like Munro, Duncan and Mamouzelos all banging on the door for their opportunity in our first-grade side. Like all other members on this site let's hope to see our NSW Cup side lifting the premiership trophy again next weekend.

Up the Rabbitohs!

Players remind us that the song has been around a long time. It would be sung on the team bus, at the old end of season South Sydney annual balls. Not just after the game. Today the song is sung loud and fast. But that wasn't always the case.

Talking to former players, you quickly find out that it pre-dates the modern era. The tune and original words even pre-date World War II. It was adapted by Bill Hinson in 1931 (brother of 1930's player Eddie Hinson) after hearing the song sung.

The melody was a popular melody in British pubs at the turn of 18th-century. It was based upon a tune from Anacreontic Society, a 18th-century club of amateur musicians in London. That society was dedicated to ancient Greek poet Anacreon, who was renowned for his drinking songs. The melody became famous when the tune was also picked up as the "The Star-Spangled Banner".
