21st Reserve Grade Premiership

The South Sydney Rabbitohs won the NSW Cup Grand Final on Sunday defeating the North Sydney Bears 22-18 at CommBank Stadium, Parramatta.

An early try to winger Alfred Smalley put the Bears in front but it wasn't long until the Rabbits hit back. A short pass from hooker Peter Mamouzelos sent Shaquai Mitchell barging over next to the posts to score. Big Shaq was on a mission and could easily have been named man of the match. In the 25th minute Bears number 6 Jesse Marschke burst through and left red and green defenders in his wake to score and regain the lead for his team. Souths kept their composure and minutes later captain 'Footy' Dean Hawkins put the ball on the toe for back rower Ethan O'Neill to slam the ball down and score. A Bears penalty goal just before half time saw the teams go into the sheds locked at 12 all.

The 2nd half produced 2 classic Rabbitohs tries that would decide the game. The first was scored by flying winger Tommy Carr after some brilliant lead up work from his teammates. A try in the 68th minute to powerful Bears forward Reuben Porter put the Bears in front again and left Souths fans wondering if the dream would turn into a nightmare. They needn't have worried because South Sydney were playing with a never say die attitude. With 5 minutes remaining and the Bunnies down by 2 points the ball was shifted to the right. Decoy runs by Shaq Mitchell, Ethan O'Neill and Jacob Gagai created diversions that the Norths defenders had no answer for. The football went out to 'Footy' Dean who rifled a long ball to Blake Taaffe in space. Blake then used his 2 on 1 overlap to draw and pass, sending Tyrone Munro over to score untouched for the game winner. This was a perfectly executed play used at the exact time it was needed. It was a glorious way to win a title.

Big 'one on one' tackles during the match by Buddy Gordon and Jaxson Rahme deserve special mention as does the try saver by 'Footy Dean' and the long break made by Matt French. A Ben Lovett

knee injury was a sad end to his year but Benny was in good spirits after the game and will be back in 2024 once his recovery is complete. All 17 players who took the field did the club proud as did their amazing coaches and staff. After the game Buddy Gordon told fans on the sideline that when he made his NRL debut in 2005, Tyrone Munro was just 5 months old!

This Sunday the Rabbitohs do it all over again on NRL Grand Final day in the State Championship title game v Queensland champions the Brisbane Tigers. The game kicks off at 1.20pm and will be live on Nine, Foxtel and Kayo.



Blake Taaffe - The Last Dance

Every Friday afternoon a group of men gather around their usual table at The Shakey. One-by-one they 'bundy on' with a quick nod but before they reach the bar their drink is poured.

The conversation always focuses on rugby league, and it's been going on for decades. No one remembers how it started but it's their outlet from the rat race.

A recurring theme is their frustrations about the modernday footballer, the consensus is they're 'over coached, robotic and too scared to take risks'. Some at the table played a bit of footy while others grew up watching but they all have an opinion on how the game should be.

A footy player that doesn't fit this mould is Blake Taaffe – he plays what's in front of him and doesn't die wondering.

The way most NRL clubs operate their pathway



systems is to produce clones of their first grade team. Players are trained and developed to play the same way which beats the instinct out of some. Thankfully Blake fell through the cracks.

From age 11 the La Perouse junior played in the Central Coast competition representing them in Harold Matthews and SG Ball. In 2018, the live-wire Taaffe progressed to the Sydney Roosters' Jersey Flegg squad but received little opportunity – you can't fit a square peg into a round hole. During the season, Blake's former coach Mark O'Meley could see what the Roosters couldn't and recommended him to North Sydney – a foot in the door, that's all Blake needed.

The next year Blake returned home to the Rabbitohs playing in their Jersey Flegg team while staying with relatives. It was another gamble Blake took to chase his dream. The season turned out to be Blake's breakout starring in Jersey Flegg, NSW Cup and representing NSW U20s. The best was yet to come, Blake won Man of the Match in the 2019 Jersey Flegg Grand Final for an outstanding performance which included two tries and two conversions. A star is born.

We can fast forward the next few years which includes in 2021 Blake making his NRL debut and playing in the NRL Grand Final by now he's caught the attention of the Friday table and the hearts and minds of many in rugby league.

Blake is a breath of fresh air to the modern game, he's a dream to coach if you're a man manager. To get the best out of Blake you show belief and let him play what's in front of him. History shows coaches who favour stats and systems over simplicity struggle with players like Blake. The table rattles off names of coaches and players that weren't compatible and those who were.

When Blake ran out in last Sunday's NSW Cup Grand Final you could fit what coach Joe O'Callahan told him pre-game onto a beer coaster from The Shakey, maybe even a postage stamp. The belief and trust is there and that's all Blake needed as he combined with Dean Hawkins to deliver the match winning moment via a Tyrone Munro try. It was an instinct play and as the table would say 'you can't coach that!'. As a result, Blake picked up another Man of the Match Award in another winning grand final.

Earlier this season Blake's departure from Souths was determined. not on his terms though – you can't fit a square peg into a round hole. This Sunday's State Championship is The Last Dance and when Blake takes the field, he won't die wondering.

1918 - Merthyr & Queensland

Rugby League was still in its early years and South Sydney had undertaken on some landmark tours of New South Wales country areas. Playing games in Newcastle, Maitland, Bathurst and in West Wyalong. Clarrie Horder led the way in 1914 when he would go play in the Brisbane competition for Valleys. And then in 1917 he returned to play for Brisbane Western Suburbs, instead of playing in the City Cup. This helped in the growth of the game in Brisbane.

1918 Merthyr – Australian Club Championship

In 1918 with Great War nearing its end South Sydney embarked on the first club tour of Queensland. Their first game was against Brisbane premier club Merthyr, who played in sky blue. Merthyr had recently come across to Rugby League in 1917 and were one of the premier club's in the Brisbane Rugby League. Merthyr would go on to become Past Brothers. The match against South Sydney was deemed the "*Club Championship of Australia*" by the Brisbane press. Merthyr were Brisbane competition leaders, having won the first round and leaders in the knockout stage. The game opened with a break from the halfway mark where Blair whipped it to Clarrie Horder, who fooled opposing centres, then passed to his brother Harold Horder who bounded for the corner with astonishing speed, before running around for an easy conversion for Oxford. Then from a scrum Blair sent Sheehan cleverly down the sideline beating several tacklers with ease. Blair did it again sending Harold Horder streaking away before linking with brother Clarrie Horder and Sheehan touching down.

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1918 Might of Queensland

Midweek South Sydney ventured up to Rockhampton to help in the township recovering the mid-year floods, winning the match 18-7. To finish the tour, a final challenge was issued by all of Queensland playing in red and white as a full state team was to take on the premiers of South Sydney. The Victorian professional sprint champion would race Harold Horder at halftime, even though Horder was also

playing in the game. It was a sensational game where Queensland came from behind and were lucky to snatch a 19 all draw. The opening try came from Blair

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cutting into the forwards who sent to O'Donnell who sent to Hallett who scored under the posts. The second try came after Hallett secured near the centre, passed to Harold Horder who outpaced all opposition to score. South third try came after a hack passing movement, followed by some scrumming play before Horder went over. Before the break half-back Dutchy Anderson scored, and Souths led 16-6. After the break saw Souths score again, with Rowley crossing in

the corner putting South Sydney up 19-6. The final quarter was dominated by Queensland as came home strong scoring three tries to snatch a draw.




The team that toured Queensland

1925 – Toowoomba



In 1925 Toowoomba were at their height as a township, having beaten English and New South Wales touring teams and took out the Bulimba Cup. After 12 successive victories they issued a challenge to the undefeated premiers South Sydney.



1925 Toowoomba

After the success of 1918 and the season being stopped in Sydney a match was quickly arranged up in Toowoomba. The match was billed as the *"Australian Championship Challenge.*" South Sydney boarded a express train at 3:30pm Tuesday for the long trip to Queensland. They finally arrived in Toowoomba Wednesday afternoon. The tough



game between two unbeaten giants got off to a tight start with Wearing playing very well in the first half, but Toowoomba dominated the half and skipped away to a 7 nil halftime lead. South Sydney's first try cam e soon after the break when Alec Johnston passed to Lapham, one of the fastest t forwards in the game swerved and ran from half-way to score. Blair kicked a penalty goal. The last twenty minutes was scientific and scintillating but scoreless, it wasn't enough on the day.

1926 - Far North Coast



In 1926 the NSW Far North Coast was the next team to issue a challenge. They had just beaten New South Wales and wanted to test themselves against the premiers South Sydney. A challenge match was arranged for Bank Holiday Monday. They were billed as the undefeated team of the Country.

1926 – Far North Coast

The match was played at the SCG and South Sydney were having a bye that weekend. Far North Coast were guaranteed £250 for the match. The match got underway in heavy conditions with Alby Carr almost scoring. After scoring a penalty goal, Souths got on the scoreboard when Thompson picked up, passed to Treweek who passed on to Root who ran smartly and scored. Souths scored again after they combined in a




excellent movement in which Finch, Lapham, O'Connor, Treweek handled before Carr scored. It would remain like this till halftime. In the second half it was Lapham with a great individual effort kicked and was interfered with and the referee awarded a penalty try. Far North Coast hit back with a try. Then right on the bell Wearing picked up the ball on his 25 and raced the length of the field to score. South Sydney unofficial state champions. South Sydney would go on to play Far North Coast twice in 1927 winning both encounters. The first at the SCG 41-20 and the return clash in Lismore 22-15.

1929 - New Zealand Challenges

During the 1928 season seeds had been planted for the first ever club tour to New Zealand. It finally came to fruition at the end of the 1929 season, when challenges were arranged between the two premier clubs of the Auckland region. After winning 5 premierships in a row, South Sydney wanted to take on the world. The NZ Rugby League agreed to split the expenses 60-40. And players in to pay for their own boat fares. South Sydney left our shores with five Kangaroo tourists and a young Percy Williams was called up into the squad.

1929 - Huntly



While this wasn't the first game on tour it was a challenge I will discuss first. The challenge came from the winners of the South

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Auckland league Huntly. It was played midweek. South Sydney got off to a good start with the forwards pressing following by a good dash from Wearing saw Eggen score. Next up was Alf

O'Connor who scored off a Binder pass. Blair in full command swept into a movement passed to Eggen who outpaced his opposition to score. Quinlivan accepted a pass from Stewart who beat several defenders before sending Eyers over to score. Halftime 20 nil. Racing at top speed Wearing snapped up a rolling ball, passed to Eyers who crossed under the posts. Stewart then passed to Blair who brilliantly beat the opposition to score a great try. Huntly hit back with a consolation try, before Wearing made a spectacular run but was bundled into touch after running 3 quarters of the field. Fulltime Souths win 30 to 3.



1929 - Marist Old Boys Match One

Marist Old Boys were the premier team in Auckland, having just won the premiership. In a packed Carlaw pack 15,000 crammed in to see the best of Auckland and South Sydney play. And they were not disappointed. South Sydney had arrived by boat a few days before this game. They took the field in the famous 5-man scrum formation, playing two 5/8's. Marist bustled South Sydney early on but a intercept by Jack Why turned the momentum of the game and Marist were caught offside as South Sydney took a early lead. A long-range goal by Quinlivan saw South Sydney extend the lead. But Marist hit back with a clever try between the posts as the led into the break 5-4. An arm wrestle of game eventuated in the second half, with Alf O'Connor losing the

ball in the action of scoring. A penalty to Marist eventuated. South hit the front when Wearing made a break. Eggen the broke away from the same attacking play who passed o Jack Why to gathered and scored under the posts, with Souths leading 9-7. Marist hit back with a try and won the first challenge game 9-10. A young Percy Williams debuted in this game.





1929 – Marist Old Boys Match Two

The return match against the Marist Old Boys was played a week later. And after a good midweek victory over Huntly, they were ready for the rematch. A few changes were made, with Watson and Reg Williams pulling out injured and South Sydney were ready for the second clash. 15,000 again thronged their way to Carlaw Park. They saw a brilliant opening to the game, but the teams were not able to score. Wearing opened the proceedings with a penalty goal. The O'Connor brother then rushed, where Quinlivan made a brilliant opening passed to Frank O'Connor who handled to Eggen who scored. Blair then cut through nicely for Wearing to score. The teams then traded penalty goals before going into the break with South Sydney leading 12-2. A kick from Marist saw Quinlivan break through the line, with Frank O'Connor passing to Eyers to score. Marit then hit back with a try. A clearing kick from Blair saw Marit fail to field and Eggen scored. After Percy Williams gained good ground, Binder dived over to seal the match, 21-5.


1931-32 – Group 9

When I was a young bloke I went to R.C.A.E. college in Wagga Wagga to become a teacher. A lovely place. The local football ground was called Eric Weissel Oval. Weissel was a brilliant fiveeight who played for NSW and toured with the Kangaroos in 1929. Despite generous offers to come to Sydney he stayed in the Riverina area.He was a member of arguably the best ever Group team from the country - Group 9.

90 or so years ago country football was very strong. All the NSW country groups would once a year come to Sydney and play against the Sydney clubs. The Sydney v Country teams would be selected from these teams and play off at the SCG.



In 1931 and 1932 Group 9 was very strong. Jack Fifield was another brilliant player in the Group 9 team.

1931 – NSW Southern Districts(Group 9)

In 1931 the Sydney premiers were crowned as South Sydney. Group 9 were the Country champions so, just like this year, the coach of South Sydney told his team that, even though you are premiers, you cannot celebrate yet as you have to gear up for yet one more challenge.


It is interesting to note that Group 9 had already beaten the 1930 premiers, Western Suburbs, at the Sports ground on the Bank Holiday weekend earlier that year and the public's appetite had been whetted for this challenge. So it was on September 19th at the old Agricultural ground that the two teams faced off in front of 20,100 patrons.



Group scored first in the match. Deeley then passed to Curran and to Treweek who ran like a back scoring between the posts. A drop ball by Spillane gave Group 9 another try. From the scrum Williams in-passed to Treweek for another try. Treweek put the team on the attack. Then from a scrum Williams created a gap for Wearing

who scored to give Souths a slender 11-10 halftime lead. After the break Williams broke away from a scrum, passed to O'Connor, who passed to Curran who scored under the posts. O'Connor was again in the clear, he passed to Root, to Deeley but before Mortimer could get him the ball went to Why to score. Why then passed to Curran who brushed tacklers aside to score. Soon after it was Williams to Maher who offloaded to Eyers who scored again. The game ended with a late try to Group 9. So South Sydney had added to the laurels they had achieved that year by winning handsomely 31 points to 15.

An interesting sidelight came after the game was over. The two teams made a circle to farewell two great players. One going overseas and one retiring. The retiring one was Benny Wearing from Souths. Except Benny must have had second thoughts over the off season and came back the following year. In fact, he played on until 1934.








1932 – NSW Southern Districts(Group 9)

A suggestion was made that the Sydney premiers should be challenged by the top country group after the Grand Final to determine the State Champions for that year. The men in charge of the rugby league in NSW thought that was a good idea so a game was formalised for 1932.

In 1932 it was on again. South Sydney won the premiership in the Grand Final against Western Suburbs 19-12. They again played Group 9 before 8,000 people playing in the early days of October.

The game was much closer. Group 9 played sensational football in the first half scoring two tries. L. Cooper was in fine kicking form and kicked 5 goals for a 2-16 lead at half time. Those in the crowd who had never seen Souths play before might have been lulled into the false assumption that the game was effectively over.

Alas, that is a poor assumption as Souths are never beaten. For 20 minutes Group 9 held South Sydney out. Then a country player took a swing



at Wearing a brawl erupted, in the end Root and Gray(Group 9) were sent off. To get South Sydney moving Deeley finally beat Weissel to score a great try. crossed. Souths then swarmed the country line. The ball worked its way to Spillane who passed a low pass to Wearing who snapped it up to score. With three minutes to play South Sydney were still behind. Wearing then scooped up a lose ball and scored in the corner. They fought back magnificently in the second half and despite desperate defence from Group 9 were able to snatch victory only a few minutes before full time. They won by 19-16.



1950's Toowoomba Again

After World War II Rugby League had a big resurgence in Sydney, and the same was occurring again in Queensland. The premier inter-city competition in Queensland was the Bulimba Cup. Between 1951 and 1956 were Bulimba Cup winners, and once again they issued challenges to South Sydney in the 1950s during their premiership winning era.


1951 - Toowoomba



Toowoomba had just won the Bulimba Cup and wanted to reclaim the Australian wide title so they issued a challenge to South Sydney the 1950 premiers. But this challenge was too hastily arranged. It was being played on a Sunday after the Saturday round of football. South Sydney boarded a plane at 6:15pm after their 3:00pm game and flew to Brisbane before taking the bus to Toowoomba. They finally arrived at Toowoomba at 12:30am. The match captured the imagination of the locals, and was billed again as the Australian Championship Challenge. Churchill took the field at five-eight, Souths got off to a lethargic start and it wasn't long before Toowoomba were ahead 2-16. Then in the final three minutes of the half Neilson cut through scoring two tries to get South Sydney back into the game. From there it was a high point scoring game, with Harry Wells scoring two tries and Harwick scored for South Sydney. But in a frantic finish handling let South Sydney down as Toowoomba hung on for a 27-34 victory.

1952 – Toowoomba Match One

In 1952 Toowoomba once again were Bulimba Cup winners and South Sydney were 1951 premiers. So for 1952 it was decided to make the contest a two match series. The first match would be held in Sydney. The first match at Redfern Oval had South Sydney get off to a good start leading 13-2 at halftime. Toowoomba fought back to make it 13 all, before South Sydney pulled away to win the game 26-19. The stars that day was Johnny Graves and Chika Cowie who both scored 2 tries.





1952 – Toowoomba Match Two

The return match in 1952 was played in Toowoomba. With the weekend competition round being washed on Saturday, playing on Sunday was not as a significant issues as in 1951. South Sydney got off to great start in the match leading 23-8, before Toowoomba came home strong to be only one point behind with five minutes to go, But South Sydney after a late penalty goal hung on to win 25-22 and win both games in the 1952 Australian Challenge series.

1954 – Toowoomba Match One

In 1954 Toowoomba once again were Bulimba Cup winners and South Sydney were again premiers, so the two game Australian Challenge was once again arranged. After two trips to Toowoomba the day after a competition round, 1954 was much better organised and played on the weekend Sydney were playing Great Britain. Only two players Jack Rayner and Johnny Dougherty would be backing up. The first match in 1954 was a high scoring encounter with South Sydney getting away to a early lead before Toowoomba came back. Les Brennan was the star that day scoring 4 tries, spelling danger every time he got the ball. While Bernie Purcell scored a try and kicked 10 goals to score 23 points in the 41-33 victory.



1954 – Toowoomba Match Two

The 1954 return match was played at Redfern, and it was a quagmire. Both teams thew the ball around despite the greasy conditions. Frequently ambulance men were called in to wash the

this afternoon.

1955 – Toowoomba Match One

In 1955 Toowoomba once again were Bulimba Cup winners and South Sydney were again premiers. But the appeal of the matches had dropped. Again, South Sydney would play the game a day after a match their country carnival match in Sydney. The country carnival was losing its appeal and the Australian Championship was heading in the same manner. Again South Sydney flew up overnight. The burden of playing a very tough game against Newcastle the day before and then flying took its tool Souths In a tough first half Toowoomba led 7-10, but ran away with game in the second half winning 17-45.

1955 – Toowoomba Match Two

The return match at Redfern would prove to be last encounter between these two great teams. Souths started well going out to a 19-5 lead on the back of two tries to Moir. But injuries to Hawick and Rayner saw South Sydney finish the game with 11 men, holding on to win 22-17 on the back of the boot of Bernie Purcell. Another drawn series

This match saw the end of these challenges for a number of years.

1968 – Australasian Challenges



After a return to success in 1967 South Sydney fielded challenges from over in New Zealand. 1967 Auckland premiers issued a challenge. With the expanded competition, mid year matches were no longer viable so when South Sydney won again in 1968 a Australasian Challenge in New Zealand was arranged.

1968 – Ponsonby

Ponsonby were the 1967 Auckland Fox Memorial shield winners, while played midweek, it was the 1967 championship game. The original challenge was issued against the 1967 premiers that had to be delayed., but now got a chance to played as South were Sydney back-to-back South premiers Sydney dominated that game with Alan Heiler and Bob McCarthy both scoring a hatrick of tries.



1968 – Mt Albert

The next game was against 1968 Auckland premiers Mt Albert who had just won the 1968 Fox Memorial Shield. In a tight contest in the first half Mt Albert led South Sydney 7-8 by a point. But with McCarthy and Bob Honan scoring two tries each and Simms kicking 6 goals, South Sydney went on to win the match 27-13. The secretary of the NZRL had glowing comments about the game, "South Sydney gave the best exhibition of Rugby League I have witnessed. The speed and variation of play was a lesson to New Zealand football"



1968 – Past Brothers Brisbane

On the way back from New Zealand Brisbane premiers Past Brothers issued a challenge to play for the **Australasian Club Championship**. So instead of heading home South Sydney headed once again to Brisbane to play a 3rd challenge match in 1968. Past Brothers had just beaten St George and felt they had a good chance of a win. The match was played at Lang Park with 20,000 people in attendance. Cleary who had missed the New Zealand leg of the tour joined the tam in Brisbane. The match got underway after handshakes and South Sydney had raced to a 21 nil lead



after 25 minutes. But Brothers hit back late in the half to bring the scoreline back to 21-10 at the break. After the break, South Sydney reverted to the famous 5-man pack with Paul Sait acting as a second five-eight. South Sydney



went to dominate the second half with double tries to Cleary, Ray Branighan, Bob Honan, Sait and Pittard, with South Sydney winning 55-15, shattering not only the Brisbane premiers but Brisbane Rugby League. And claiming undisputed title of Australasian Club Champions.

It would take 26 years before another Sydney premiers v Brisbane premiers challenge match was ever arranged again.





Players Song

We'll guzzle, guzzle, guzzle and we'll tip it down our muzzle And we'll sing out the order loud and clear: More beer! And we'll drink all night until we're very tight At the shades of wherever we are

Six hefty forwards and seven greasy backs And plenty rabbit barrackers to keep the bludgers back When the skin and hair is flying and the slaughter has begun Three cheers for the good, old Rabbitohs For the victory we have won

Up the Rabbitohs!

Players remind us that the song has been around a long time. It would be sung on the team bus, at the old end of season South Sydney annual balls. Not just after the game. Today the song is sung loud and fast. But that wasn't always the case.

Talking to former players, you quickly find out that it pre-dates the modern era. The tune and original words even pre-date World War II. It was adapted by Bill Hinson in 1931 (brother of 1930's player Eddie Hinson) after hearing the song sung.

The melody was a popular melody in British pubs at the turn of 18th-century. It was based upon a tune from Anacreontic Society, a 18th-century club of amateur musicians in London. That society was dedicated to ancient Greek poet Anacreon, who was renowned for his drinking songs. The melody became famous when the tune was also picked up as the "The Star-Spangled Banner".


Western Sydney Stadium W 22-18
